Sports premium funding 2017-2018

The funding has been provided to achieve self-sustaining improvement in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools. It is important to emphasise that the focus of spending must lead to long lasting impact that will live on well beyond the Primary PE and Sport Premium funding.

It is expected that schools will see an improvement against the following 5 key indicators:

1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kick-starting healthy active lifestyles
2. The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
5. Increased participation in competitive sport

<p>Focus on improving indoor PE space through resources and facilities.</p> <p>Current indoor space is very small, and not originally intended for PE and Sport. Very limited in terms of activities that can be done with any number of pupils.</p> <p>An improved indoor space will allow for a better quality of activities to be done. Coupled with extra indoor resources, indoor PE and Sport should have greater potential for developing pupils skill base.</p>	<p>A new indoor space has been acquired and work will begin to adapt this into a new indoor PE space. Flooring, walls etc will be more suited to PE and Sport, and the space will no longer be used for games etc at breaktime allowing it to be kept in better condition for PE lessons.</p> <p>New indoor resources to be sourced and purchased ready to be used in the new PE room when ready.</p>	£500	<p>New indoor space is slightly bigger and much more fit for purpose. Activities are more meaningful and adaptable, allowing more skill development in the pupils. Outdoor activities are complemented and consolidated in a much more significant way.</p> <p>New indoor resources have allowed a broader offer and a wider range of activities. Due to the success of previous competitions, good links have been built up between a few of the local schools, and this should mean that competitions and friendly tournaments can be arranged during the next few years.
